A MUSICAL JOURNEY Hurough STRATHMORE'S CAMPUS

Sonic Trails combines technology and music for a unique outdoor experience.

Like a village green, Strathmore's campus is a place to make connections. Joi Brown, Strathmore's artistic director and vice president of programming, describes the current *Sonic Trails* installation as another way to "activate that space."

Sonic Trails is an immersive sound experience where visitors traverse Strathmore's 16-acre campus using a free GPS app they downloaded to their phone, creating a unique composition for each user. "As you're moving around the campus, you become a partner in creating a custom music experience," says Brown. "No two people are going to have the same experience."

The sweeping installation is active through December, with music adapted from a Baltimore Symphony Orchestra (BSO) recording of *The Imagined Forest*. Composed by Grace-Evangeline Mason of the United Kingdom, BSO performed the piece's US premiere last year, under the baton of Jonathon Heyward.

Strathmore's *Sonic Trails* experience was created and mapped by the Holladay Brothers, who pioneered this



idea of "location-aware music," as they call it. *"The Imagined Forest* is very evocative and has beautiful layering and separate sections, which allowed the Holladay Brothers to create distinctly different audio experiences throughout campus," Brown says.

Sonic Trails invites participants to explore at their own pace 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Upon entering the campus, instructions guide users on downloading and using the app to enjoy the music while strolling.

This immersive audio journey also enhances the celebration of Strathmore's upcoming 20th anniversary, offering a fresh dimension to the visual and performance aspects cherished on campus for nearly two decades.

"Whether you're a seasoned visitor of Strathmore's campus or simply someone in need of something beautiful and serene, this experience is for you," she adds. "It's a bit of a break and refuge from the craziness of the world."

GOOD HOPE GROOVES

Strathmore's Bloom at Good Hope concerts in Silver Spring uplift the community and musicians alike.

From Latin jazz to spirituals to Afrobeat percussion, Judy Croker makes it a point to attend most of Strathmore's free concerts at the Good Hope Neighborhood Recreation Center in Silver Spring, one of many free Bloom by Strathmore programs. Not only does Croker enjoy the diversity of music, but she also values the location's convenience—the center is less than a mile from her home.

"The concerts are well planned and organized," she says. "Most definitely the venue is a major influence, and being free encourages an eager, well-packed audience."

That is precisely the intent of Bloom's year-round concert series, which takes place every second Saturday of the month. While Strathmore is renowned for its free summer concerts on the lawn at its North Bethesda campus, it also extends similar opportunities at Good Hope, located in the Colesville area, near New Hampshire Avenue. One of the program's primary goals is to reach broader audiences across the county, including communities without easy access to Strathmore's main campus.

"The Bloom stage has opened doors for many artists from the surrounding communities to perform. Many of the artists that have been selected do resonate with the community," says Monika Hammer, communications program manager and public information officer for Montgomery County Recreation. "One big impact has been the introduction of the audience to the different forms of art, artists, and types of music. Members of this community may not previously have had access to these types of experiences, so seeing them brought right into their backyard has been very impactful." The concerts have also played a role in bringing new members to the recreation center, which offers amenities such as a gym, fitness room, and game room. Some attendees use these facilities before or after the concerts, notes Hammer.

"Visitors and community members have had an overwhelmingly positive response to the concert series," she says. "They have expressed how grateful they are to have the opportunity to enjoy the free live concerts and enjoy quality family time."

Spring concerts featured performances by pianist Joshua Jenkins, specializing in Cuban and Brazilian music, plus acoustic animal-themed music with Kevin Elam. Both artists are alumni of Strathmore's Artist in Residence (AIR) program.




Music enthusiasts will get another chance to immerse themselves in Cuban music on July 13, when the ensemble Raíces Negras takes the stage. Led by AIR alum Ceylon Mitchell, a flutist who also performed at Good Hope in 2022, the concert will showcase the fusion of Afro-Cuban rhythms and European classical instruments.

"This concert will highlight the Cuban *charanga* tradition, which really took off in the 1940s and '50s. It was spotlighted and promoted through the musical group Orquesta Aragón. I want to pay homage to that group," he says.

"To be able to put this ensemble together is really a dream of mine. People can't help being moved by *charanga*'s universal appeal. It will very much be an interactive experience," Mitchell says. This summer's concert will differ from Mitchell's previous Strathmore performances. As an AIR, he performed with a larger ensemble at the Mansion at Strathmore to a noticeably different audience than at Good Hope.

"My last Bloom concert was very diverse from an ethnic and racial perspective," he says. "There's a really [big] population of Brazilian and Cuban cultures [at Good Hope]. It's a good experience for the audience to see musicians with similar backgrounds."

BEYOND THE WINNERS' CIRCLE

Juried exhibitions foster artistic evolution—and not just for the winners. by Kate Oczypok

An invaluable platform for local and regional artists to promote their talent, juried exhibitions can set artists on a path to success. They can also serve as catalysts for artistic growth and community engagement, even for artists whose work isn't accepted into a show.

"We think of our juried exhibitions as one of the many ways to assist artists," says Lesley Morris, director of Strathmore's Mansion Galleries. "When artists reach out with questions, we can provide them helpful tips on how to enhance their submissions or refine their artistic vision."

Earlier this year, Strathmore hosted its 32nd annual juried exhibition, *Prism*. The theme challenged artists to explore the communicative power of color across a wide range of media, subjects, and styles. Morris was particularly interested in seeing innovative uses of color combinations.

"While commercials and advertising often tell us what colors are 'trendy,' artists who combine unconventional colors like orange and gray or turquoise and lime demonstrate that color theory is flexible," she says. "Nothing should necessarily be 'in' or 'out." Strathmore exhibitions typically have singleword titles like *Prism*. Cathy Abramson, a local representational oil painter, has participated in several shows, including one called *Touch*. She appreciates the open-ended nature of these themes, which are intended to spur the imagination.

One of Morris's favorite shows was the 2019 juried exhibition, *Night*, featuring depictions ranging from abstract to realistic across various media.

"I was surprised by how artwork dealing with darkness requires careful consideration of light source, resulting in unexpected elements among the participating artists," she says.

When considering jurors for these exhibitions, Morris prioritizes individuals with a background in art who understand the complexities of various mediums,








such as clay, fiber, glass, and watercolor. She also seeks jurors knowledgeable in design theory, including composition, size, rendering, and rhythm.

Furthermore, Morris values jurors who appreciate artists as a community and recognize the importance of encouraging individual artistic expression.

"We want people sensitive to artists submitting for the first time," Morris says. "I never want to work with anyone who disparages such attempts. It takes courage to share artwork revealing personal emotions and ideas."

While there is an entry fee for all juried exhibitions, Morris notes that Strathmore's fees are affordable typically around \$30 for submitting up to eight pieces. Proceeds support visual arts at Strathmore, including more than a dozen free exhibitions every year and free or low-cost companion programming. Additionally, these exhibitions have a long-standing history of awarding cash prizes; Strathmore awards a combined total of \$900 in prize money to the recipients of the best in show, second, and third prizes.

Abramson, who enjoys painting local scenes, cityscapes, and interiors, has never won a prize at Strathmore's juried exhibitions. Despite this, she always feels supported by Morris, jurors, and fellow artists alike. "Lesley and I have had art conversations during

Ladan Ebrahimian, a local artist specializing in glass painting, has also participated in numerous Strathmore shows, including the 90th Annual International Exhibition of Fine Art in Miniature in 2023. She views Strathmore's opening night receptions as valuable opportunities for artists to engage with curators and jurors. At one event, a juror curating another show invited Ebrahimian to give a talk at a DC think tank, an example of how juried shows can open other opportunities for artists.

"Juried shows are a great way for artists to have their work evaluated and recognized by experts in the field," she says.

Abramson agrees. "You have to get yourself out there," she says. "There's no reason why you should have all your paintings under your bed."

Q&A: EMMA ASH

A former Strathmore intern shares highlights from last summer.

At every Live from the Lawn concert this summer, you'll be welcomed by our enthusiastic interns. They play a vital role in ensuring the smooth operation of this free concert series, creating a memorable evening for both attendees and artists. Strathmore offers paid internships every summer across various departments.

We spoke with Emma Ash, a senior at Muhlenberg College studying Media and Communications, about her internship experience with our Programming team last summer.

Why were you interested in Strathmore's summer internship program? I wanted to develop and challenge my event planning and booking skills gained through working at my college radio station and planning a music festival at Muhlenberg. I was particularly struck by this internship because it mirrored my interests and passion to learn more about artist relations and the ins and outs of live music. I was looking to expand my tool kit for supporting live music (and eventually touring) in a nurturing and professional environment.

Were you previously familiar with Strathmore?

I was! I attended CityDance Ballet Summer Intensive at Strathmore when I was in middle school. Having grown up in the area, Strathmore has been a household name, so I knew about the organization from a distance. Before interning, I was mystified by what the organization accomplished and stood for; I thought of Strathmore as an organization that just hosted classical music (not a bad thing!) and was unapproachable. This was not accurate at all. Strathmore was one of the most supportive, welcoming, and safest spaces I have been in. I was pleasantly surprised to learn how musically diverse their lineup is as well. Strathmore is saturated with creativity, kindness, and curiosity. I feel so grateful that I interned for an organization that challenged me and let me be my goofy self every day.

What were some of your key responsibilities as the **Programming intern?** Some of my responsibilities included preparing artist contracts and invoices, advancing shows and production sheets, doing hospitality runs, selling merchandise, and writing show recaps. I also happily worked at Live from the Lawn concerts, being the first face to greet artists, ensure their comfort, and escort them to the stage. It was awesome to work closely with artists and use my attention to



detail [to help] prep and execute two shows a week. I also learned about nonprofit budgets, operated and calculated merch settlements, coordinated events such as the staff talent show, and handled various tasks behind the scenes at Strathmore's UkeFest.

Can you describe a significant project or task you completed during your internship? My internship concluded with a one-on-one presentation of artist research for future programming, where I gathered details like genre, label/agent info, previous shows, social media statistics, and estimated rates. It's exciting to think that an artist I pitched may be in a future Live from the Lawn! The tasks I completed as the Programming intern gave me a taste of A&R, live music production, and the booking agent lifestyle that I loved and want to continue immersing myself in.

Were there any surprise takeaways from your time at Strathmore? I improved my public speaking skills by introducing each band and Strathmore's guidelines to thousands of people at each Live from the Lawn concert. Also, with the help of Beth Radovsky on the Programming team, I learned how to play a few chords on the ukulele!



Bustin' loose at Strathmore!

Born in the DC area in the 1970s, go-go music has become integral to the city's cultural identity. Strathmore has presented remarkable go-go artists throughout the years, including the "Godfather of Go-Go" Chuck Brown, both in the Music Center and at Live from the Lawn. This year's outdoor concert series brings go-go back to North Bethesda, with EU featuring Sugar Bear on August 9.

W'AIR ARE THEY NOW?

Nistha Raj, Class of 2014

With training in Western and Indian classical music, violinist Nistha Raj's compositions blend tradition with innovation, transcending cultural boundaries to unite global audiences. Recently, she shifted her focus from performing to being a cultural arts leader, cofounding the community platform District of Raga. In that role, she curates events like The Alaya Project, a recent show at AMP by Strathmore that explored the intersection of Carnatic Indian classical music with jazz and funk.

How did Strathmore's Artist in Residence (AIR) program help advance your career? It provided me with invaluable support and skills that enabled me to successfully launch and release my debut album to a sold-out crowd at the Mansion.

What are a few specific skills that you learned?

So, launching an album is a very big endeavor, and it was new for me. Cathy Fink and the mentors guided me through that process, from reviewing the music that I had recorded and helping me get everything logistically together. There was also learning the business skills of being an artist. You know, there's a lot that sometimes gets overlooked like how to do your taxes, how to market yourself, and how to get the gig. What sort of opportunities were made possible by being an AIR? When I was in the program, we all got a



date to perform on Millennium Stage [at The Kennedy Center]. I forged a very strong relationship with Diana Ezrins, who was programming [that series] at the time ... and we work to get together to this day. (Ed. Note: Ezrins is now Wolf Trap's director of programming.) She's been a huge part of how I grew my organization, District of Raga.

What upcoming project are you most excited

about? Through my work with District of Raga, I curate events that showcase and preserve the performing arts culture of South Asia. I'm excited about expanding this work and our community, and I'm looking forward to the third season of a series of concerts that I curate and copresent in collaboration with Wolf Trap at the Barn, as well as presenting more concerts in partnership with Strathmore.

ARTISTS INSPIRING ARTISTS

Exploring the collaborative growth between Arts and Social Justice Fellowship mentors and mentees.

Emon Surakitkoson

The distinct and transformative nature of Strathmore's Arts and Social Justice Fellowship (ASJF), with core partner Woolly Mammoth Theatre Company, is what attracted mentors Alexandra N. Sherman, Rashad Ali Muhammad, and Emon Surakitkoson to the program—a concept each artist wished had existed when they were students.

Launched in 2022, ASJF pairs high school artists from Maryland, Virginia, and Washington, DC, with working artists who serve as mentors. These professionals work alongside program facilitators Tavish Forsyth and Blue Cavell-Allette to support the students in creating projects at the intersection of arts and social change. Having participated in solo and group exhibitions at Strathmore and other galleries, Sherman, Muhammad, and Surakitkoson had the practical experience that mentors need.

In the wake of the pandemic, political discord, global environmental struggles, and escalating oppression, Sherman sees Strathmore's fellowship as a source of light during these dark times, as art always does. "It just feels like an injection of hope to have a program like this," says Sherman, a painter and mixed media artist based in Round Hill, Virginia, who was excited to mentor two young visual artists.


Fellows receive a stipend to support their projects however they wish, an important provision for young artists who may lack financial resources, explains Sherman. It's one of the ways she sees the program conveying an important message to its young participants: "We want to hear your voice."

One of Sherman's mentees, Jada King, created a sculpture and presentation about workplace pay inequality, and the other, Myla Leung, used multimedia, collage, and decoupage to address plastic pollution. Knowing that they might not have fully developed their own practices, Sherman encouraged them to start with sketching and writing. Later, she provided them with resources to complete their projects, including supply recommendations and video tutorials for their mediums.

At the end of the fellowship, which also prioritizes community-building and peer-to-peer learning, the student artists held a showcase of their work at Woolly Mammoth. "I was just blown away by the passion, energy, and dedication of these young people," Sherman says.

"It was really impressive how professional and motivated they were," agrees Muhammad. "The mentees were articulate and confident in their bodies as they shared what inspired them. I left rejuvenated and inspired to create new art."

The opportunity to make a difference and the social justice component drew him to the program. Muhammad, a mixed media collagist, focuses his work on addressing diverse groups of people about shared human experiences. He sees ASJF providing similar permission to explore humanity, which is important for teenagers transitioning into adulthood and for young artists honing their craft. As a mentor, he answered technical questions about the ways to use different media for various effects, but most of his role involved affirming the visions of these rising artists.

Surakitkoson adopted a similar mentoring style. Much of her advice centered on the empowerment and encouragement she believes young creatives need to thrive in a career that often feels unstructured. "Everyone needs to find their own voice," she told her mentees. "What kind of artist do you want to be, and what do you want to say?"

She also instructed her mentees on discovering opportunities, such as approaching small businesses to

showcase their art, and the importance of tuning out distractions. "When I create, I only have myself to impress," she says.

Surakitkoson's black-and-white abstract paintings are designed to be timeless, inviting viewers to engage with her work no matter where they are. However, as she mentored her two students, she found herself considering adding color to her work—an idea that thrilled her yet made her anxious. "I didn't want it to look like a rainbow," she admits. Instead, she sought to use color to add depth and wonder to her pieces.

Recalling the advice she gave her mentees, "You can do whatever you want," she began experimenting with color in her paintings.

"I was speaking to them, but they also taught me," Surakitkoson reflects. "[My mentees] gave me as much as I gave to them."
