Lila Downs's 2017 performance at Strathmore didn't just captivate audiences. It marked the launch of a new educational initiative: the Windows series. Designed to deepen audience connections, Windows pairs select performances with complementary events that explore the artists' work and perspectives beyond the stage.

A singer-songwriter, Downs is renowned for her distinctive voice and charismatic performances, blending traditional Mexican genres like rancheras and corridos with jazz, hip-hop, and American pop. Her latest album, 2023's *La Sánchez*, is a tribute to the sounds of northern Mexico, maternal influences, and the dynamics of personal and social relationships. In *On the Corner*, SFJAZZ's magazine, Downs described the album as her "contribution as a woman from the south who also considers the music of the north as her own and who would like to hear more female voices joining in."

The daughter of a Mixtec mother and a Scottish-American father, Downs has spent nearly three decades using her platform to connect cultures, honor her roots, and advocate for social change. Themes of social justice, such as immigration and women's rights, are woven throughout her music, reflecting her deep commitment to activism.

"Lila Downs has managed to create a singular artistic voice and retain her agency in a male-dominated industry and genre," says Lauren Campbell, Strathmore's vice president of education and community engagement. "She skillfully harnesses the power of her music to elevate issues like indigenous language rights, immigration, and women's freedom. We wanted to hear local women artists speak to how they navigate questions of identity and integrate their artistry with social justice."



The preshow event, *Women Artists on the Intersection* of *Music, Politics, and Identity,* featured a panel discussion with DMV-area artists Josanne Francis, Chao Tian, Irene Clouthier, and Lena Seikaly. Inspired by Downs's integrity and activism, the panelists explored how they navigate pressures to represent their cultures and genders while maintaining their artistic freedom.

Since its debut with Downs, Windows has expanded significantly, from two events in 2017 to 11 this season. The series now includes interactive formats, such as dance workshops, cultural showcases, and community jams. For example, the April 2024 Calabash Arts Market celebrated West African arts ahead of Gambian kora player Sona Jobarteh's concert with live music, dance, and artisan wares.

"These events aim to help audiences enter the performance with more context and richness," Campbell explains, "making the experience more connected and meaningful."

Over the past decade, Strathmore has been increasing international programming, with Windows highlighting diverse perspectives from global and American artists, including BIPOC, queer, and other underrepresented voices. While the series has expanded in size and scope, Joi Brown, Strathmore's artistic director and vice president of programming, underscores that it remains driven by the artists. When Downs returns to Strathmore in March, Windows will feature a pan-Latin American market with local vendors, performers, and community organizations to celebrate her cultural impact.



Planning for Windows is one of the education team's most anticipated meetings of the year. "It's such an exciting challenge to explore all the dimensions of a performance and create pathways that help audiences dive deeper into the experience," says Pablo de Oliveira, Strathmore's education and community manager. His work includes partnering with local embassies, cultural organizations, and nonprofits to enhance selected performances and connect Strathmore with the broader community.

For example, collaborations with the Gambian embassy opened doors to educate DMV patrons about Jobarteh's culture while a partnership with the Potomac Riverkeeper Network on Allison Miller's *River in Our Veins* led to ongoing discussions on local water conservation.

"Our goal," Campbell says, "is for people to be amazed by the richness and layers within every performance. I want them to leave marveling at how much there is to learn."

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AN INVITATION TO SHINE

Emerging visual artists find confidence and support at Strathmore's Invitational Gallery

For close to a decade, a special space inside the Mansion at Strathmore has served as both a gathering place and a launchpad for future artists.


The Invitational Gallery, located on the second floor of the Mansion, is an intimate, light-filled space. In the height of wedding season, when the Mansion hosts two or three ceremonies a week, brides prepare for their milestone day in the

Invitational Gallery. During the week, the room is also used for meetings. Nearly 10 years ago, Strathmore staff decided this space needed something more—that rather than blank walls, the room should welcome its guests with art, explains Lesley Morris, director of Mansion and Galleries.

Because this is Strathmore, the mission of supporting local artists and their creative lives quickly became central to the gallery's outreach.

"Specifically, we wanted the Invitational Gallery to highlight emerging artists," Morris says. "We wanted to create a space that allowed an artist to create a body of work for an early-career, solo or two-person show."

The Invitational Gallery hosts about five shows a year, each lasting 8 to 10 weeks, giving artists a strong



be seen. While other galleries at the Mansion explore diverse themes and mediums, the work featured in the Invitational Gallery can be more commercial to take advantage of sales opportunities, according to Morris. Emerging artists also benefit from the network of art enthusiasts who come out to support established shows at Strathmore.

Jordann Wine was one such artist. A Bethesda native, she remembers catching fireflies as a kid at Strathmore's outdoor concerts. She was thrilled when the Invitational Gallery hosted her first solo show, *Infinite Glitter*, in 2018. Wine created 13 works of overlapping geometric shapes—large-scale paintings that invited introspection and shone with glitter. She and her brother Kenny Wine, a woodworker, also built two benches for gallery visitors to sit and take their time with the art.



Wine's work earned a mention from a *Washington Post* reviewer who wrote, "Whether mystical, mathematical, or practical, all the forms shimmer in Jordann Wine's *Infinite Glitter*." That recognition was meaningful to Wine, who had created murals and other public art, as well as participated in group exhibitions, but had only had one solo show before being invited to exhibit at the Invitational Gallery.

After *Infinite Glitter*, Wine participated in three more solo shows and dozens of group shows. "I just felt so supported with this show, and it really helped my career," she says. "It's wonderful how much Strathmore does for the local art community" by creating a gallery specifically for emerging artists and instilling in them the confidence to pursue other opportunities.

In 2022, the Invitational Gallery hosted Rashad Ali Muhammad's first solo show, *LIBERATED*, which featured 10 mixed-media collage pieces exploring authenticity and the concept of freeing one's inner self—an undercurrent in much of his work. The show also marked the first time Muhammad used flower petals in his art, a motif he continues to use.

Like Wine, Muhammad says exhibiting at the Invitational Gallery was a pivotal moment. "A lot of people know Strathmore as a cultural center, so you get a lot of foot traffic. I definitely felt like people recognized my work and my artistry more after that show," he says. In November, Wine and Muhammad returned to the Strathmore for a show together—this time in the Mansion's main gallery. *Intersections* was a "conversation between art," says Muhammad, who was excited for the collaboration and saw the show as a chance to "expand my style and try something new." Once again, he used flowers in several pieces but also created portraits of "everyday deities," ancestors, and guardians keeping watch and sending messages for those they protect to decode.

Wine, who took time off before the show to recuperate from burnout, worried she would not complete her work in time and spoke with Morris about potentially dropping out. Morris encouraged her to stick with the show. And Wine decided that, in addition to her glitter work, she would try some less intensive sculptural pieces, including faux stained glass. All of the work showcased geometric shapes. That conversation with Morris reminded Wine of the many ways Strathmore uplifts its artists.

"It's quite lovely actually that there is so much support for artists at all seasons of their career," Wine says.

W'AIR ARE THEY NOW? Rochelle Rice, Class of 2015



Rochelle Rice, Artist in Residence (AIR) Class of 2015, is a singer, songwriter, and podcaster whose connection to Strathmore has only deepened since her residency. Now serving as program director for the Artistic Advancement

Fellowship, Rochelle reflects on the lasting impact of her residency and Strathmore's commitment to supporting artists throughout their careers. "Strathmore does a great job, particularly Betty Scott, of walking alongside us and continuing to engage with our artistry and work," she says. "It's not a one-touch experience—it's a true partnership."

How did your Strathmore residency impact your career?

When I did my Strathmore residency, I was singing but had no recordings. I didn't know where to begin. The biggest thing that came out of my residency is my album, *Wonder*. Cathy Fink lit a fire under my talent. She connected me to Bias Studio and helped me gather a timeline. Some of the music on the album I wrote during my residency.

What was most memorable about your experience as an AIR?

The most memorable part was feeling "held" throughout the process. Most Strathmore AIR are beginning their careers and, even though there was so much I didn't know, I was tapped into people who could guide and invest in me. That has continued. I've maintained a relationship with Strathmore all these years. It feels like home, whether singing for a gala, coming to donor experiences, or doing the student Blues concert every year. Now I'm developing the Artistic Advancement Fellowship, which feels like a natural progression of my relationship with Strathmore.

Can you describe this new fellowship?

The Artistic Advancement Fellowship is fully individualized, supporting two fellows not only with financial but also operational and strategic resources to help move their careers to the next level. That includes helping them establish, navigate, and maintain industry relationships. Fellows are paired with mentors to develop a game plan: Do they need to tour, rebrand themselves, or record a new album? It gives fellows the resources and people power to do what all artists want to do but often can't as independent brands.

What was your role in developing the Artistic Advancement Fellowship?

In 2021, Betty Scott came to me about a new program and asked me to think about what it might look like. I spoke with AIR alums, reviewed Strathmore surveys, and pitched this idea. Strathmore provided resources and time to spend two years of research and development, and we're continuing to refine it.

YOUTH CHORUS ON THE RISE

Strathmore's young singers expand their horizons with new opportunities and a fresh name.

Strathmore Children's Chorus, founded 12 years ago by the late Christopher Guerra, has experienced remarkable growth and transformation. The chorus teacher at A. Mario Loiederman Middle School for the Creative & Performing Arts, Guerra envisioned a program to create a home at Strathmore for young singers across the region. Inspired by the Children's Chorus of Washington, he laid the foundation for a program that would expand access and engage young singers in Montgomery County—a single ensemble of nearly 100 young singers performing at Strathmore.

Since Guerra's retirement in 2017, Artistic Director Michael Wu has carried forward this mission, growing the chorus to nearly 200 singers across six ensembles. Reflecting the maturity of its members, many of whom are now in middle and high school, the ensemble was rebranded this season as Strathmore Youth Chorus (SYC).

"We wanted to make sure the name reflects the strength of the experience for students of all ages," says Lauren Campbell, Strathmore's vice president of education and community engagement. "We've always focused on building strong, independent singers through rehearsals and performance prep, but since Michael joined, we've added a music theory curriculum—an extra layer of learning beyond the





around the region.

A highlight of the past year is the establishment of SYC's Touring Chorus, which traveled to the Appalachian Young Voices Festival in West Virginia last June. In April 2025, the group will perform in New York City, where they'll also attend a Broadway show, participate in workshops with Broadway actors, and work with nationally recognized choral clinicians.

Lily Fischer, 16, describes the opportunity to tour during her second year at SYC as "really cool," noting the close connections formed in the smaller group and the chance to perform additional songs. "We have a lot of fun together," she says, adding that performing on the Concert Hall stage never gets old. "It's just amazing to be able to stand there with that huge audience and be able to sing," says Fischer.

In December, SYC's Touring Chorus made its television debut in the WETA Arts Songs of the Season 2024 special. Performing the piece "Shiru," filmed at its 2023 holiday concert, the chorus was one of 15 groups featured on the program.

Upcoming performances include the Maryland Young Voices Festival in Baltimore this March, a collaboration on John Rutter's "Mass of the Children" in April, and their spring concert at Strathmore on May 31.



IRAKERE

Joeito

A wah-wah guitar pedal, the kind used by guitarists like Jimi Hendrix and Eric Clapton, and the batá, a traditional Yoruba drum, aren't exactly a natural pairing. But you'll hear both in "Bacalao con pan," the explosive breakout hit by Cuba's legendary ensemble Irakere, which still sounds fresh five decades after its release.

> The song, which nods to a typical Cuban meal of codfish served with bread,



illustrates exactly what Cuban pianist Chucho Valdés envisioned when he formed Irakere in the mid-1970s with fellow musicians from the Orquesta Cubana de Música Moderna: blending ancestral Afro-Cuban instruments and rhythms with contemporary jazz and rock sounds to create something entirely new.

With Irakere, Valdés and his bandmates turned a new page for Cuban music. Their innovative approach to Afro-Cuban jazz—a genre that first emerged in New York in the 1940s through Cuban expat musicians like Mario Bauzá and Machito—rewrote the musical rules for generations of Cuban artists to come.

Half a century after Irakere's inception, Valdés and the contemporary iteration of the band will take the Strathmore stage for *Irakere 50*, a tribute to the trailblazing ensemble and its enormous impact on Latin jazz. Valdés, 82, will lead a nine-piece orchestra in a musical retrospective at the Music Center on May 11.

"He is really the most influential figure for modern Afro-Cuban jazz," says Joi Brown, Strathmore's artistic director and vice president of programming, about Valdés. "He's the one that broke down the door and created this incredible influx of that genre of music to the United States."

With its bold blend of genres, instruments, and sounds, Irakere is a music aficionado's dream. Valdés and the band, which originally included musicians like trumpeter Arturo Sandoval and multi-reedist Paquito D'Rivera, fused Afro-Caribbean folkloric and dance genres with elements of jazz-rock, bebop, funk, classical, and whatever else caught the musicians' ears. Irakere's lively percussion section played the Batá, a double-headed hourglass drum, along with congas, maracas, bongos, claves, chekeres, and more. Their rhythms were rooted in global musical traditions yet completely inventive.

Irakere's colorful sonic palette captivated fans across Cuba. In 1977, it also drew a significant admirer from outside the island: Dizzy Gillespie, the eminent bebop bandleader, who heard the band play in Havana and tipped off Bruce Lundvall of Columbia Records. When Lundvall heard the band, he signed them on the spot and arranged for them to perform at Carnegie Hall. It was a breakthrough moment: Irakere swiftly became globally renowned, winning a Grammy Award for Best Latin Recording in 1980.

Valdés reminds Felix Contreras, co-host of NPR's Latin music program *Alt.Latino*, of another grand pianist and bandleader: "He's very much like Duke Ellington, because Duke Ellington used to say his band was his main instrument," Contreras said. "With Chucho Valdés, when I've seen him with a big orchestra—with horns, percussion, vocalists, and all that—it's the same thing. It's like he's getting the different tonalities, the different aspects, the different textures out of it. It's the same thing he does with the piano."

In August, Valdés visited NPR for a *Tiny Desk Concert*, delivering an intimate solo piano performance. It was a "total geek-out moment" for Contreras, who once interviewed Chucho's late father, Bebo Valdés, another legendary Cuban pianist and bandleader known for his mambo and chachachá compositions. *Irakere 50* will also be a full-circle moment for Brown. In 2015, Strathmore hosted the musician for a 40thanniversary celebration, right around the time Brown began working at the venue.

This time, Valdés is "hyper-focused on working with the next generation of up-and-coming musicians," Brown said. "On this tour, he's really embracing his role as the venerable mentor of the genre and helping lift up the next generation of artists."

"It's such an honor," Brown added about bringing Valdés back to the venue a decade later. "We have hundreds of gorgeous performances, but there's something about having somebody with such a vast history and such a high level of contribution to the industry center stage in this room that just reminds you why you do what you do."
